MANY MET THE PRESIDENTS!

History came alive on Sunday, February 13, 2005, when the Historical Association hosted Presidents Washington and Lincoln during its *Meet The Presidents Celebration*. Eyes bulged, cries of "Look!" sounded, and giggles heard as children and adults alike entered *Lakeview's* front parlor and they saw the Presidents standing together in the back parlor, ready to greet them.

The day started with the Presidents and guests gathering in the dining room for the singing of *Happy Birthday Mr. Presidents* and the cutting of the presidential birthday cake, donated by Mendoker's. Every guest received a piece of the cake at the end of his or her visit.

After a brief welcome and history of *Lakeview* by Association President Ron Becker, the guests then had the opportunity to mingle with the Presidents, ask them questions, have their pictures taken with them, and listen as both described their times and commented on the common problems they shared during their administrations, some eighty years apart.

The personal military bodyguard who accompanied his president - the white buckskin-clad Revolutionary soldier for President Washington and the blue-clad Union soldier for President Lincoln, made the Presidents' visit even more authentic. Outside Revolutionary and Civil War soldiers stood guard in front of *Lakeview*, also adding to the authenticity of the occasion and acting as an attraction for visitors. The Lincoln Coach, of course, also got its share of attention, especially when President Lincoln posed for some pictures while sitting in it.

On hand too was Mr. Richard Patterson, Curator of the Old Barracks Museum in Trenton. Mr. Patterson, whose visit was sponsored by the Horizons Speakers Bureau of the New Jersey Council for the Humanities, talked to our visitors about the daily lives of the common Revolutionary War soldier and

HELMETTA: FROM SNUFF TO SNUFFED OUT



Helmetta, New Jersey is facing a crossroads in its history. Once a town built around its industry, the Helme Snuff Mill may soon meet its demise as redevelopment plans call for demolishing all the structures. In an effort to preserve the memories of the Helme Snuff Mill, the Jamesburg Historical Association in conjunction with the Helmetta Historical Society will be unveiling a new temporary exhibit, "Helmetta: From Snuff to Snuffed Out". This exhibit will be open to the public in *Lakeview* Mansion beginning June 12, 2005 from 2:00 - 4:00 P.M. and run through September 10, 2005.

The exhibit will features items recovered from the Helme Snuff Mill during a recent tour, Helme tobacco products, historical photographs of the mill district, and memorabilia purchased from eBay. Various varieties and sizes of tin cans, bottles, and cartons (most still filled with snuff!), past and present photographs from the inside of the factory, and an original window and bench are included in the display.

1ST ANNUAL PHOTO ARCHIVE DAY

On Sunday, June 26, 2005, the Jamesburg Historical Association will hold its first annual photo archive day. From 2:00 - 4:00 p.m., members of the Association will be set up in the meeting room with a laptop and scanner to digitally scan images while you wait. PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Contrary to popular belief, the Jamesburg Historical Association is alive and well and making its name and presence felt in the community! While its activities may have slowed down for a while, the Association has now caught its second breath and is as strong as it was at its founding twenty-six years ago. Just reading through this issue of the *Lakeview Record* is proof of that!

In order to continue doing all this, the Association needs your support, both financially and physically. We are facing tough financial times. The rising operating and maintenance costs have severely affected our annual budget. Although income has increased because of our increased activity, we're barely getting the bills paid. *Lakeview* needs extensive repairs, beginning with the foundation and continuing right up to the roof. Thanks to the support and cooperation of State and Jamesburg officials, we were able to obtain some grant monies to install a handicapped accessible bathroom and begin repairs on the foundation. The bathroom opens up the possibility for more grants, which we are actively seeking. Thanks to the backing of local businesses, we've been able to cover the cost several events and from which we received donations from participants. Here is where you come in.

The bulk of our income comes from membership dues. We need to increase drastically our membership base. If every member took just a few minutes to approach two or three friends or relatives and encourage them to join, we could triple our membership listing.

With the introduction of "The Century Club" membership level, we hope that many of our current individual members will consider increasing their membership level. Within the next few months, the Association will announce the "extras" of this new membership category.

In addition, we need members to approach their employers to see if they match contributions. If so, we ask these members to consider contributing to the Association as well as their membership dues so that we can receive a matching donation from their employer. If your employer does not match employee contributions, ask them to consider a yearly corporate membership in the JHA? My thanks to those dedicated volunteers who continue to show up every day or week to "keep things going." Without their valuable and dedicated help our house would not be as beautiful and inviting as it always is.

With our increased schedule of events, we need more people to make them successful realities. Our twice-monthly open houses are attracting between 20-40 people each. We need docents (tour guides) to take them through *Lakeview*. If you like talking to people, this is the job for you. LOOKING AHEAD TO BUCKELEW DAY

Three hundred twenty years ago William Davison built a one-room house for his family. Little did he know that by 1870 that room would eventually become just one of twenty-three rooms in *Lakeview*. With this in mind, the theme for Buckelew Day 2005 is *The Year to Save History: 320 Years in the Making*. Buckelew Day will take place on Saturday, September 10th, 12:00 noon-5:00 p.m.

We plan to span those three hundred twenty years with exhibits, displays, activities, reenactments, and talks about events and activities which occurred over this span of years. To date we have commitments from Civil War Reenactors, Revolutionary War Reenactors, an herbalist, hearth-cooking specialist, and staff members from the Old Barracks, Trenton, who will conduct seventeenth and eighteenth centuries children's games. Several Civil War battle reenactments are scheduled to be performed over the course of the day and funding for the popular *Trolley Tours of Historic Jamesburg* has already been obtained.

The Association is still lining up individuals and groups to participate in the day, as well as seeking out grants and funding from State and County agencies and corporate sponsors.

Buckelew Day is the Association's biggest activity of the year. Many hours are spent in preparation, the day itself and cleanup. We need volunteers for the committee. If you would like to be a part of this year's Buckelew Day, please call the Association as soon as possible, 732-521-2040.

MOUNTING STONE RECOVERY PROJECT

"Saving Jamesburg History, One Stone at a Time"

The Jamesburg Historical Association has recently acquired a nineteenth century mounting stone from 190 Buckelew Avenue, future home of Family Dentistry. In April 2005, the stone was discovered sticking out onto Buckelew Avenue by Borough Historian Thomas C. Bodall. Upon further inspection and uncovering in May 2005, it was determined that this large rock was indeed a granite mounting stone, which at one time every home in Jamesburg possessed. When horse and buggy were the main source of transportation, these mounting stones were essential in assisting carriage riders a step down before the ground. The owners of the property gave permission for the Jamesburg Historical Association to obtain the stone for *Lakeview* Mansion because sidewalks and curbing was being put in, meaning that the stone would have been lost forever if not removed. Thanks to John Czapiga, owner of Gray Rock Supply in Jamesburg, the stone was lifted May 11, 2005 and placed on the grounds of *Lakeview* Mansion, with the hope of placing the stone in front of the house at a future date.

The Jamesburg Historical Association is looking to acquire a hitching post to go along with the mounting stone, in an effort to recreate an authentic and very common streetscape

SOUTH JERSEY GHOST RESEARCHERS VISIT LAKEVIEW

Friday the 13th could not be a more perfect night for ghost hunting! Thanks to the work of Don Benhardt, Jr., the South Jersey Ghost Researchers (SJGR) conducted an investigation at *Lakeview* to either debunk or confirm the many stories of haunting in the mansion. Conducting an investigation similar to Ghost Hunters on the Sci-Fi Channel, a team of eleven investigators split up into two teams to make sure that every room of the house, including the basement, were covered. Using infrared thermal scanners, EMF detectors, TriField detectors, motion sensors, tape recorders for electronic voice phenomena (EVP) readings, and both digital and 35mm cameras, the team had a full arsenal for detecting spirits. After a quick run through of the house at 9:00 p.m., the group split up, darkened the entire house, and began investigating for the next three hours.

The events that unfolded were amazing – the house is alive and well with spirits! Throughout the course of the night, the third floor of the house was one of the most active hotspots. Many of the researchers were able to connect with the spirits residing in the house and relayed stories that match the "lore" of the house. One spirit was sensed in the basement and the spirits of dogs and children were present throughout the house. Even Mr. Ralph Marryott was even reported being felt on the second floor near his family photographs.

This was a very special experience for the Historical Association to partake in. A full report of the night's activities is expected to be announced and available in June or July during a Sunday open house. Watch our web site and the newspapers for a date. 100 YEARS AGO



Jamesburg and Monroe were preparing to celebrate Decoration Day, a day set aside to decorate the graves and remember Civil War veterans of both sides (it wasn't until later in the 20th century it became Memorial Day, a day to honor all veterans of all wars.) Forty years after the end of hostilities some of Col. Issac Buckelew's N.J. Volunteers still marched in the parade.

The Cranbury Press led off their Memorial Day Edition with a Patriotic Illustration and a poem entitled "Muffle the Drums" by W.H.A. Bromstead:

Muffle the Drums.
 Let the bugles blow softly on this hallowed day
 March with reverent step and slow
 Homage to wars martyred heroes play
 Over the graves of our hallowed heros
 Low droops the flag where a nations is weeping
 Blow bugles blow,
 Softly and low
 Over the fields where our blest dead are sleeping.

ASSOCIATION HOSTS MEETING

On Sunday, April 17, 2005, the Jamesburg Historical Association hosted the Spring meeting of the Historical Associations of Central Jersey Meeting. NEW JAMESBURG HIGH SCHOOL ROOM BECOMES A REALITY

As this issue of the *Lakeview Record* goes to press, plans are underway to begin the restoration and renovation of the former *Louis Kerwin Room* into the new *Jamesburg High School Room*. The Jamesburg High School Alumni Association plans to spend \$10,000.00 to repair the ceiling, restore the hearth, install shelving in the closet, improve the lighting and paint the room before moving the cabinets and artifacts from the current JHS Room into the new room.

In addition to restoring the room, the Association will also refurbish the trophy cases to better display the school's many athletic trophies and will be purchasing other items necessary for the display of other school memorabilia.

The Alumni Association began this project in October, 2003, and has already raised more that 75% of the projected cost. Once finished, the High School Alumni Association will merge their collection of JHS-related artifacts and memorabilia with that of the Historical Association. All work in the room is being done without cost to the JHA. We sincerely thank the JHSAA for their generous support of the Historical Association in funding this important project.

Once all the Jamesburg High School items have been moved into the new room, the Historical Association plans to make some repairs in the vacated room before transforming it into the *Louise Kerwin Room of Jamesburg History*. As funds permit, this room will display artifacts and memorabilia commemorating Jamesburg's great history.
