One of the Association's prized possessions is the Lincoln Coach. James Buckelew loaned this coach to transport President-elect Abraham Lincoln when he visited Trenton to address the State legislature in 1861 while on his way to Washington, DC for his inauguration. Housed in Trenton for many years, the coach was returned to Jamesburg in 1970 and restored by the Jamesburg Historical Association.





"LAKEVIEW"

Each day thousands of people on their way to new adventures and romance drive through the Borough of Jamesburg unaware of its fascinating history or the eventful lives of James and Margaret Buckelew. As they pass through town, they see the Buckelews' home, Lakeview, a "house of many windows," from which many different people have watched and been watched during the everchanging life of Jamesburg for over three centuries. From the original one-room structure built in the late 1600s, through the last renovations in the late 1800s, Lakeview has become the beautiful twenty-three house it is today. It entered the National Register of Historic Places in 1979 and the State Register in 1981. Lakeview is owned by the People of Jamesburg and entrusted to the care of the Jamesburg Historical Association.
